ALK Positive Lung Cancer (UK)

Financial hardship experienced by ALK-positive lung cancer patients.

Introduction

ALK-positive lung cancer is a rare form of lung cancer occurring in about 5% of non-small cell lung cancer. Patients are likely to be younger than other lung cancer patients and to have never smoked or been only light smokers. About 90% of patients are likely to be diagnosed at Stage 4 when there is no cure, although modern drugs can often prolong lives for many years.

About half of patients are likely to be under 50 years of age when diagnosed and may have young families. Many are in the middle of their working lives.

Financial hardship survey


In 2023, Lung Cancer Europe conducted a survey to ascertain the level of financial hardship experienced by patients as a result of living with lung cancer and 84 ALK-positive patients living in the UK took part in the survey.

This report records the responses of those 84 patients, of whom 71% were women.

Results

Over half of patients reported experiencing some level of financial hardship as a result of the disease and had to reduce their household expenditure.

The financial hardship breakdown





1 in 3 patients had reduced their expenditure on basic household items and 1 in 5 had cut back on leisure spending.



changed their plans, e.g. retirement, career development, new car. 66


My husband and myself took early retirement. I couldn't work due to extreme fatigue. My husband retired early to look after me but also to spend as much time together while we could.

Some patients reported having difficulty managing on their household income



Financial hardship should be discussed as a matter of routine between

patients and their healthcare teams.



A diagnosis of lung cancer brings stress and anxiety and financial hardship adds another layer.



Healthcare

teams should establish clear referral pathways to agencies that can give financial advice and support.
